Clergy Letter

Keeping a good Easter

One thing I find a bit strange about the Church of England is the way we seem to focus more on Lent than on Easter. I know the Lectionary gives us 6 Sundays in Lent and 7 in Easter, but it's easy to feel that Easter is over once we are back to work after the Easter holidays.

This same balance can be found in theological textbooks which will give a chapter or more to trying to explain how Christ's death on the cross saves us and then skips over the resurrection and the ascension. But without the resurrection Christ died on the cross and stayed dead. It's another martyrdom, another person being crushed by the power of the Roman state.

But Christ did indeed rise and then ascended to the right hand of God the Father. In raising Jesus from the dead God confirmed that Jesus is who he says he is, God as a human being. So, what he spoke and taught comes straight from God. The resurrection also shows us that Jesus is the pioneer of our faith, our trust that nothing can separate us from the love of God, not even death itself, is rooted in historical reality.

So how are you going to celebrate this for the full 50 days of Easter, from Easter Sunday to Pentecost? If you gave up something for Lent to help you come closer to God, what could you take up for Easter? What will show your joy to those around you, that each day we can say 'Alleluia Christ is risen: he is risen indeed, Alleluia'!

St Mary's - quietly radical

Emily Price, Mayor of Totnes 2022 - 2025

Even as someone who is not a member of the congregation, I have always felt that St Mary's Church belongs to all of us in Totnes. Standing at the heart of our historic town, its stones have witnessed centuries of joy, grief, change and continuity, and stepping inside brings a sense of calm that feels increasingly rare. It is a place people turn to for reflection, music, remembrance, community events or simply a moment of peace, regardless of belief. Whether you step inside for a moment of calm, a community event, a concert, a vigil or simply to admire its beauty, there is a sense that you are entering a shared inheritance rather than a private space. What makes St Mary's especially valued is the role it plays in the life of the town. It is loved and used by the wider community, and that openness is embodied by its rector, Father Jim Barlow, and his team, whose approach makes clear that this is a place of welcome, not exclusion.

I am really looking forward to the church's re-opening after its refurbishment. The aim to make the building more flexible for multiple uses feels entirely in keeping with its history. Churches have long been at the centre of community life – places not only of worship, but of gathering, shelter, celebration, music, conversation and peace. Enhancing St Mary's so that even more people can use it, enjoy it and feel at home there seems like a natural continuation of that tradition.

In a world that often feels hurried and divided, St Mary's offers something quietly radical: a space of calm, beauty and connection, open to all. I hope that, once reopened, it will continue to grow as a place where the whole town can gather – a living heart at the centre of Totnes, just as it has always been.

At the Parochial Church Council AGM we welcomed Dr Francesca Ashworth as PCC member replacing Richard Soans who has stepped down as churchwarden after thirty-seven faithful years, for which we gratefully thank him. He will continue as Churchwarden Emeritus and will continue to be consulted on every matter.

The Quinquennial Inspection of the church was recently very thoroughly done by Grant Elliott of Le Page Architects. His report will be with us soon. He signed the visitors' book and wrote the comment: 'Beautiful Church very well looked after'. A kind thought and much appreciated by all who volunteer at St David's.

The swift box, complete with two cameras, is in action in the tower thanks to Nick Mallalieu and Hugh Clayson. We hope the swifts will nest in the tower again this year. The churchyard had been strimmed and the rewilded section is full of wild flowers and benches that will soon be repainted. The Lent Lunch raised £302 plus £130 already collected. A grand total of £432 will be received by Shelterbox from us for their Tent for Lent Appeal. Thank you to Jill and Caroline and the Team. This will help to alleviate suffering caused by a brutal war that could have easily been avoided by following the teachings of Christ.

The Swift nest is now "Taylored"

Following the successful nesting of at least three pairs of swifts last summer and with some kind donations from Sustainable Ashprington and from a few parishioners we have been able to buy two cameras for two of our eight nest boxes. We have also bought a new Swift Caller from Devon Swifts. Over the last few months we have been clambering up and down to belfry to test and fit the cameras. They are now installed in two of our boxes that showed evidence of use last year. These cameras can be viewed if you download the Green Feathers App (this is the company we bought the cameras from). Please then set up an account by email and a password on the Green Feathers App. I was told not to sign in via Google, Apple or any other third party. Once you have done that please let me know I can add you to the system so you will be able to view on your smart phone. I am expecting the swifts to return at the end of April or the beginning of May. A small donation of £2-5 would be very much appreciated as we need to keep the boxes and cameras in good repair and perhaps add further cameras.

Sustainable Ashprington Chewing the cud – a walk and talk to meet the animals of the Sharpham 'Wild for People' project with Simon Roper, director of Ambios 10th June, 5pm – 6:30

You may have seen the farm animals on the land at Sharpham and wondered why 'rewilding' includes farm animals? You may have thought that 'rewilding' means just letting nature take over? Well it's more accurate to think of it as 'increasing biodiversity for nature recovery' which actually needs careful land management. So this is a chance to find out more, and meet the woolly Mangalitza pigs, the Belted Galloway cattle and the Konik ponies up close and personal. You will hear how they increase the range of micro habitats at Sharpham with their different foraging habits of nibbling, browsing, grazing and rooting to allow different types of wild plants, insects and small mammals the diverse spaces they need to thrive. At the same time you get a wonderful guided walk through the breathtaking Sharpham estate.

Simon is a passionate and fascinating top expert, and the walk and talk will be fun, practical and engaging with plenty of opportunity to ask questions.

Notes from the March meeting of Dittisham Parish Council.

Present: Parish Cllrs Bond (Chair), Golding, J Green, N Green, Hawkes, Neale, Unitt & Taylor were present, as was C Radford (Clerk). County Cllr Rake was present for part of the meeting. 2 members of the public attended.

Apologies: Cllr Pope, D.Cllr McKay

Notes from Cllr Rake.:

The Budget has been passed. The Financial Settlement from Government was better than expected, however the burden of finance of local government is being shifted from general taxation to local taxation. County level council tax can't be put up beyond the 4.9% limit set and it can't be put up by less otherwise the Council risks 'stepping off the escalator'.

Budget headlines include a total of £19M for highways, and £4m fund for potholes, white-lining and vegetation. This is still not enough but an improvement on last year. There is a 7% increase in Children's Services.

Libraries: The proposed DCC budget cut for Libraries has been reversed. A £1M reserve has been set to support the transformation. There were 20,000 representations to the public consultation which has now been called in for review.

Torcross: The C.Cllr is proud of the County's response to the collapsed road at Torcross. Officers have done everything they could do to support the acute problem. The chronic problem still needs consideration.

Grant Applications The West Dart Bus and Dittisham Store have applied for grants and the applications will be reviewed first by the Finance Committee before making a recommendation to the Parish Council.

The Maintenance Contract with Arccas, who maintain the grass and vegetation on the Ham, Level Carpark and Old Chapel Burial Ground, has been extended until 2022?

The Maintenance Works – Jon Hodge secured the contract to carry out the following maintenance work: 1. Laying two sections of concrete foundation along the base of the Ham wall to prevent undermining of wall by wave action. 2: Replace 3 posts in the Ham Car Park; 3: Replace 1 slat on bench on the Ham; 4: To repair wall in the culvert next to the footpath to sailing club; 5: Fix guttering to the bus stop on Riverside Road.

Planning Applications: Red Lion Inn, The Level. Construction of ground floor bay window, rear first floor extension, installation of three Juliet balconies, & roof light. SUPPORT the application.

Herongate, Lower Street, Dittisham, Householder application for new incidental outbuilding OBJECT to the application with the following comments: Inappropriate development in a conservation area, inappropriate development in a national landscape and visual impact from the river

Blackberry Cottage Surface Water Drainage

Cllrs Bond and Taylor met with the structural engineers who compiled the surface water drainage report. The meeting clarified that the 'infrastructure' would stop at the boundary line and the clean surface water run off would run into the culvert. The owner confirmed that the gully would be cleared regularly. The view was that the easement wouldn't be required, and no commercial benefit would be appropriate. The Construction Management Plan has been provided and confirms that the logistics will come via the Dart, and up the path to the rear of the property. This will be done at high tide so it shouldn't interrupt public access. Concerns were about the track leading from the foreshore being degraded as a result of the contractors' use. This issue to be raised with the landowner to obtain confirmation that it would be restored if damaged.

Potential new car park and burial ground: The Cllrs who had attended an information sharing meeting with proposed project managers reported further funding of approximately £10,000 would need to be raised to support a comprehensive preapplication process. The Parish Council has been identified as a potential source for that funding, alongside the Red Lion, the Village Hall, St George's Church and the Dittisham Charity. Further discussions will be taking place. It was reiterated that the Parish Council had already agreed to be the named party on an options agreement for the land and would cover the legal fees of up to £2000.

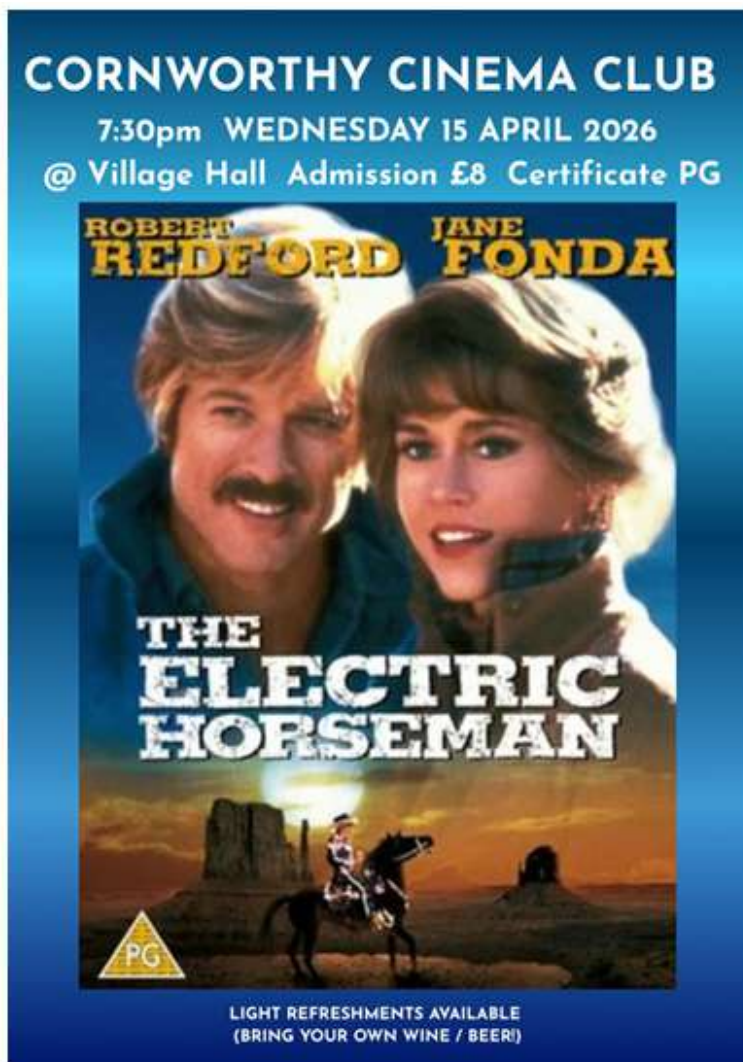

Our Motoring Correspondent

Private plates, or to give them their correct title, Cherished Marks, are a feature to be seen on many of our cars and the business is worth billions of pounds. In fact nearly £3 billion since 1989 when DVLA started to sell numbers and is now a veritable cash cow to the Treasury. This Gov't department has cleaned up here and as a business model, it has no equal. Consider the facts:

Firstly, this is a total monopoly on the sale of registration numbers. No one else can sell from the bank of previously unused numbers, or older numbers that got returned to DVLA when cars were scrapped, exported or written off.

Secondly, there are armies of clever folk at DVLA working out smart combinations which will appeal and have value when launched via the on-line auctions. These previously unused registrations sell for many thousands of pounds.

Thirdly, the raw material cost is zero. The number plate is created out of thin air and at all times, the plate actually belongs to DVLA. You simply own the right to display the number plate.

Fourthly, transfer fees and retention fees (£80) continue to earn DVLA money each time the plate is moved from car to car or placed on retention with this revenue stream often earning as much each year as the sales.

Fifthly, I nearly forgot, all sales proceeds attract a further 20% Vat for the Treasury, once again!

Oh, and sixth, all registrations and the entire system is enshrined in law.

Due to the increase in new registrations every year, plates were introduced in 1963 with a suffix letter (A, B, C, and so on) although only in Middlesex for the first year so A suffix plates are very rare. On Jan 1st 1964, all new cars had the suffix B. However, motor manufacturers soon complained that this concentrated new car sales to just one period of the year so the plate change occurred in August from 1967. Thus the E plate lasted just 7 months. This then resulted in car sales having a New Year surge as well as a summer new plate surge.

By 1983, the suffix had reached letter Y and the system was replaced by a prefix and it started all over again until 2001 when the 51/02 52/03 sequence started. Consequently, pre-1963 number plates evolved into a kind of status symbol but also concealed a vehicle's age.

Legislation requires the correct spacing of letters and digits so as to enable automatic number plate recognition (ANPR) cameras to work and to prevent the formation of words to personalise your car. But in order to promote sales of DVLA's new found wealth from the private plate industry, they themselves were guilty of pushing the boundaries. A hypothetical plate DE51 RED was used in their marketing and advertising to suggest the word DESIRED in 2001. Tut tut.

Famous numbers include COM1C (Jimmy Tarbuck) MAG1C (Paul Daniels) MOV1T (Cliff Richards). Glamour model and sex symbol Fiona Richmond had FU 2 on her E Type Jaguar and Tory MP Gerald Nabarro had six plates from NAB 1 to NAB 6 adorning his luxury cars.

Perhaps this identification marking your own car out wasn't such a clever idea if you spent too much time parked outside the pub or anywhere else you shouldn't be!

High hitters include K1NGS (£185000) 51NGH (£201000) DEV1L (£240000) KR15HNA (£180000) with 250 selling for £400000 probably now on a Ferrari 250. Recent figures show DVLA sold £150M worth of plates and £110M of fees in 2023.
